Uganda calling: Intrepid Deputy Headteacher heads off to Africa

An intrepid Deputy Headteacher has travelled to Africa to see first-hand how pupils from the Epworth Education Trust's schools are supporting children in Uganda.

Sarah Taylor, Deputy Headteacher at Westleigh Methodist Primary School, has embarked on a 10day visit with Edukid - a charity that helps children living in poverty or conflict to access education.

Mrs Taylor said: "This really is a once in a lifetime experience and is the next step of our work that has been developing over the last two years."

As part of the trip, which is funded by the charity, Sarah will be visiting Kirombe Primary School and Kich Goma School, both in the northern region of Gulu. During the visits she will be meeting the children and their families, teaching some lessons, and discussing with them how children in the UK can support their aims and aspirations.

Sarah added: "I am heading over as part of a team of about 40 teachers, secondary students and Edukid staff from across the country to learn about how the education system works in Uganda. "Most excitingly though, I will get to meet and listen to the children we are working in partnership with. It is unreal. We are also taking lots of letters from our children, and hopefully

we will be bringing messages back. I really hope that this is the start of something special, that we can continue to support these children in Uganda throughout their education."

The partnership through Edukid is part of the ethos of the Epworth Education Trust.

Julie-Ann Hewitt, CEO, said: "Our aim is simple, and that is as a Trust we want to "do all we can". That is not just in terms of us helping others, but also in finding innovative ways to make learning across our schools as exciting and engaging as possible.

"Our pupils get as much from this partnership as I hope the 12 children from Uganda receive. It is fantastic for our children to learn about another continent and see how interconnected the world is. Small actions can make a big difference both here and somewhere else thousands of miles away."

When Mrs Taylor returns, she will be sharing her experiences with the 2,000 children across the Epworth Education Trust family.



Wesley Warriors raise valuable funds for Edukids

The first annual Wesley Warriors event - featuring a tough mudder, colour run and bubbles galore - has raised over £1,500 in aid of Edukids.

In a day full of fun for the whole community, everyone involved played their part in helping to raise funds to support two children who are sponsored by the school, throughout their education in Uganda.

Rhys Jones, Headteacher, said:

"We have had lots of positive feedback from parents who have now requested an annual Wesley Warriors. It was great to come together as a family to 'do all we can' for others and to show our courageous advocacy in supporting others less fortunate than ourselves."

Learning about special places for Christians

Reception class pupils at Nutgrove Methodist Primary School have been learning all about special places of worship for Christians.

During a visit from the School Chaplain, Deacon Helen Coleman, the children found out about places across the world that have become the heart of Christian communities. These included a blow-up church, a café church, a house church, an outdoor church, and a forest church.

Deacon Helen explained that Christians can talk to God wherever they are – whether that is in a traditional church or a different type of place of worship.

One pupil said:

"My favourite church was the one on the grass because you could have a picnic while you worship Jesus." Rachel Bottell, Headteacher, said:

"Our sessions with Deacon Helen are such an important part of our collective worship and our Christian Values of 'Love, Hope and Respect' underpin everything we do.

"It was wonderful to see our youngest pupils engaging in conversations about their relationship with God and places that they could worship in the future."



Education Sunday

Pupils from Bedford Hall Methodist Primary School have conducted a very special service for the congregation at Bedford Hall Chapel.

During the service, pupils from pre-school to Year 6 spoke about how their school curriculum has motivated them 'to do all the good they can'. This is based on three curriculum drivers that help to shape the curriculum, promote the school's aims and values, and address community needs - culture, diversity and possibilities.

Early Years and Year 1 pupils were very excited to talk about culture. The youngest pupils showed photos of different festivals they have celebrated, including Chinese New Year, Diwali, Easter and Christmas, while Year 1 children talked about how they had been inspired by work in the Methodist Artwork Collection and how they have recreated artwork on a chosen theme.

Diversity was discussed by pupils in Years 2, 3, and 4. Year 2 discussed what they had learned about Rosa Parks, who fought for inclusion for all. They spoke of their school being inclusive in the same way – a place where everyone is special and unique and equally valued.

Year 3 pupils talked about inspirational black people that they had learned about, including Malal Yousafi (an activist), Grace Nicols (a poet), and Simone Leigh (a sculptor), people who have all shown the importance of resilience and being a courageous advocate for what is important. Year 4 pupils then chose to talk about Pride month and how the LGBT+ community are valued and celebrated and celebrated as individuals – all linked to Bedford Hall's vision to 'love, without limits'.

Children in years 5 and 6 discussed different possibilities. Year 5 presented what they had learned about famous people who had persevered and never given up in order to achieve their dreams. While Year 6 pupils described the chances they have at school to discover and cultivate their talents and interests, as well as how joining clubs has given them the knowledge, abilities, and confidence to join larger groups outside of school and further their capabilities.

Kevin Meredith, Chair of Governors at Bedford Hall, said: "The children, parents and staff at school were all welcomed by our congregation, and always will be. The school ethos of learn, love, live: without limits was demonstrated and the children shined a bright light that morning in our chapel - we hope they come back soon."

Amy Burkes, Headteacher, added: "It is hard to find the words to describe how proud we were of the children for the remarkable Sunday Service that they delivered at Bedford Hall Chapel. Our school values are at the heart of our school, they represent the world around us, our children and our wonderful wider community. It has been fantastic to see the children speaking so confidently about how they live by our values every day."



iSingPOP

Earlier this term, pupils from Wesley Methodist Primary School received a visit from iSingPOP

iSingPOP is a singing, performance and resourcing project that encourages children and families to participate in Collective Worship in school, at church, and at home.

As part of the four-day programme, pupils across the school spent time learning ten catchy pop songs and dances based on important and inclusive Christian values. This culminated in an extra-special performance for parents – which they could get involved in too!

Rhys Jones, Headteacher, said: "What an incredible way to get our whole school community involved in collective worship by singing and dancing together.

"The children thoroughly enjoyed their time learning and performing the songs, it has really brought the importance of singing during worship to the forefront of our thinking and we'll certainly be developing this further next year."



The story of John Wesley

Year 5 pupils at Nutgrove Methodist Primary have brought the story of John Wesley to life as part of a presentation for the whole school community.

Featuring exceptional acting, singing and creative costumes, during their performance pupils also portrayed the history of Methodism, which was founded on John Wesley's beliefs that everyone should have a close relationship with God and care about those who are in need.

Rachel Bottell, Headteacher, said:

"These ideals serve as the foundation of our school's motto, "My Best, Always, Everywhere," and we urge all our pupils to uphold them. A particular highlight of the performance was singing "And Can it be," a traditional Methodist hymn, which was composed by Charles Wesley, the brother of John."

"Seeing the children presenting what they have learned about John Wesley and his connection with our school's values was a privilege and made me incredibly proud. Our thanks go to all of the parents, carers and friends of our schools who joined us for this special occasion."



Inspiring a love of music

Music plays a huge role in daily life at Westleigh Methodist Primary School, providing a variety of possibilities to assist and enhance the children's musical education.

During a special live performance from a percussion ensemble, pupils across the school were in awe when they heard music from across the world this term. They also had the chance to take part in DRUHM ALOUD during a jam-packed day of entertainment. This included taking part in 'Find Your Beat' sessions, which use the power of DRUHM to connect, break down boundaries, and give the children the courage to approach life in a positive way.

One Year 2 pupil described feeling 'totally amazing and ready to learn' after one of her music sessions, which was just the icing on the cake!"

The Year 5 children also had their own 'design a poster competition', with the winning entry set to go on display around the school to create year-round awareness of the clean air initiative.

While, Year 6 children participated in a pre-and post-event traffic data gathering exercise. On Clean Air Day, traffic was drastically reduced by 50%, which was an excellent outcome!

Topping off a busy day, Rosehill's Debate Club recorded a superb debate on the subject, which is set to air on Tameside's community radio very soon.

"We believe that it is incredibly important to empower our pupils to have their say about causes that matter to them. They delivered a very important message on Clean Air Day and they undoubtedly contributed to spreading awareness and enacting change for the better."
